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RIVER NOTES: (paddle times are approximate only)

Access points are at:

Ngahuringa (Cherry Grove) (in Taumarunu),
Offinepana (accessed from River Road SH43).

Taumarunu to Ohinepate (21 km, 3½ hours)

Cherry Grove to the confluence of the Whanganui and Ongarue rivers. There is a short portage in the Ongarue river which can be used to portage. This first leg features continuous current and passes mostly through farmland. Te Moate bridge, the only bridge across the Whanganui River, is reached after 10 km. The river then passes through the town of Taumarunu and Pipiriki, is reached around half an hour before the campsite at Ohinepate.

(36.5 km, 6 hours)


After 2 to 3 kilometres the river turns south and joins with River Road (SH43) which runs along the river bank. It is here that the river is crossed by Hauea during the Land Wars of the 1860s. A little further along at Nukuhiva there is a private museum of river history up on the right bank. The campsite at Pukaria is just after the bridge at 20 km. The river then flows through Taumarunu, at one time the upstream terminus of the steamer service from Whanganui.

There is more native bush along the riverbank now, though farmland still with some remnants of bush. The river then turns west and follows the Whanganui as it reaches at Marokorokau, a historic reserve. On the flat above the south bank of the Ohura River are two further Hauea sites, a war pole built in 1864 and a peace pole built in 1865.

Once past the remnants of the Sauhata settlement the farmland peters out and the river flows through bush-clad hills. The campsite at Mahanui is reached on the right bank, where there is another 15 km paddle to reach Whakahoro at the confluence of the Parapara and Whanganui rivers. The campsite here marks the first sustained section of river on the journey from Taumarunu where there is no accompanying parallel road.
